INTRODUCTION. Incarcerated parents and their children are at higher risk of losing their relationships forever. Children with incarcerated mothers are a greater risk of experiencing CPS (state) removals than children with incarcerated fathers. About 15-20% of children entering into court-monitored foster care placements have an incarcerated parent. Thus, practitioners are urged to invest more attention to incarcerated parents and their children because the consequences for those sentenced imprisoned or jailed for lengthy periods can be devastating to their family.
